
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SHERIFF'S MESSAGE

"Get Used to Different"

"The Times They Are a-Changin" is a song written by Bob Dylan and released as the title track of his 1964 album. Dylan wrote the song as a deliberate attempt to create an anthem of change for the time, influenced by Irish and Scottish ballads.

Ever since its release, the song has been influential to people's views on society, with critics noting the universal lyrics as contributing to the song's lasting message of change.

56 years later, 2020 has proven to be a year of above average change. There are no doubt agendas being pushed on people from all directions with more opinion and sentiment then I've personally experienced in my 53 years of life.

Don't get me wrong, I'm not against change, and I regularly talk and prepare for change when it comes to Public Safety, Law Enforcement and the quality of life within our communities right here in Chelan County and North Central Washington, but not at the sake of the United States Constitution and peoples personal choice when it comes to lawful actions.

PATROL

The Patrol Division of your Chelan County Sheriff's Office is led by 4 Sergeants and 4 Corporals These supervisors manage approximately 30 deputies assigned exclusively to patrol. These deputies comprise 4 patrol shifts consisting of 2 dayshift squad and 2 nightshift squads. These 4 squads proved the citizens of Chelan County 24 hour a day coverage every day of the year.

We place a huge emphasis on training here at Chelan County and provide each deputy with bi-monthly training that focuses on De-escalation Tactics, Legal Updates, Defensive Tactics, and Emergency Vehicle Operation. This year our agency has been identified as a "Regional Hub" for Patrol Tactics Instruction or P.T.I. Agencies from around the State are sent here to trainings put on by our local P.T.I. trainers. This training is in response to the State Legislation mandating police reform. Our cadre of instructors and their program have been trailblazing and setting the standard throughout the State. This training is focused on 5 main principals that can be used in every call a deputy might respond to. This training has proven to de-escalate situations by using time, distance and shielding resulting in lower uses of force.

This year we were once again able to host the 3-week leadership course titled "Police Leadership: The West Point Model". The CCSO is dedicated to mentoring and training the leaders and future leaders of our agency by hosting and sending them through this amazing course. We already have the course scheduled to come back in 2021!

Your Chelan County Deputies pride themselves on service to the county and the citizens within it. Our Patrol deputies cover approximately 3,000 square miles of land, and 73 square miles of water. We provide 24-hour coverage for the county to include the 4 contract cities of Leavenworth, Cashmere, Entiat and Chelan. We consider it a great honor to serve you all and do so with Integrity, Teamwork and Excellence



DETECTIVES

The Chelan County Sheriff's Office Investigations Unit during 2020 was very busy and dealt with a lot of changes. The investigations group contains one sergeant, three civil service detectives, and one rotational detective who rotates between patrol and detectives every 3 to 5 years. Detectives were responsible for investigating 271 incidents in 2020. 2 persons assigned to the group also supervise 180 registered sex offenders. 2 of the 5 positions in detectives left due to retirement in 2020. Longtime detectives Jeff Dilks and Randy Grant moved on after many years at the Chelan County Sheriff's Office.

Notable cases of 2020 include:

2 Special Investigation Unit incidents, wherein Chelan County detectives were asked to assist in the investigation of outside law enforcement agency involved deaths. One case involved an armed felon shooting at multiple officers in Riverside, Okanogan County, WA, and upon the officers returning fire the felon was killed. Another case involved Douglas County deputies in Rock Island, Douglas County, WA, responding to a domestic violence call, encountered a man with a gun, shooting him as he took aim at another person in the household.

A large number of trailhead vehicle prowls took place in Chelan County, mainly up the Icicle Road and Blewitt Pass areas. After weeks of stakeouts and extra patrols, little was learned. Eventually a USFS employee got a partial vehicle description. 2 detectives responded to the area, split up, and began looking for the vehicle. One detective found the suspect vehicle driving on a remote road, stopped it, determined the driver had an arrest warrant, and located thousands of dollars worth of recently stolen items taken from cars moments earlier at a nearby trailhead. After that arrest, the vehicle prowls diminished by 90%.

A 17 year old missing girl from Waterville, Douglas County, WA, was found in a shallow grave at the top of Horse Lake Road. This was at the start of the COVID19 outbreak in Washington State and during the statewide lockdown. Due to those concerns, the autopsy had to be done at Harborview Hospital in Seattle. Detectives responded to Harborview, took part in the autopsy, and the manner of death was determined to be homicide. Detectives have since interviewed more than 30 persons, searched multiple locations and vehicles, and have made an arrest and charged Julius Ceballos with 2nd Degree Murder.

A massive wildfire started in the Colockum area. Thousands of acres were burned. CCSO detectives received information from numerous sources about the cause of the fire. Probable cause was developed and the suspects were located camped in an RV in the Malaga area. A search warrant was obtained for their RV, they were arrested, and are pending trial at this time.

COLUMBIA RIVER DRUG TASK FORCE



The Columbia River Drug Task Force currently consists of three agencies. The host agency, Chelan County Sheriff's Office, provides a task force commander, a sergeant, a detective, and an analyst. East Wenatchee Police Department provides one detective and Wenatchee Police Department provides one detective. Douglas County Sheriff's Office will provide a detective in the spring of 2021.

Detectives worked 49 narcotics

investigations. The task force removed 37 pounds of methamphetamine, over 3 pounds of heroin, and just under a pound of cocaine from our streets. The Task Force has seen an influx of fentanyl laced pills into our area. The task force has removed close to 1400 pills from our streets. CRDTF seized over \$103,000.00 cash and property in 2020. The task force is a self-sustaining entity. These seized funds provide for the on-going investigation costs and day to day operations.







Even though marijuana has become legal in Washington State, illegal grows and sales are a problem. Marijuana is grown here locally and illegally sent out of state. The task force conducted several investigations involving illegal indoor grow operations. The task force locally has removed 89 plants, over 63 pounds of bulk marijuana, and a large amount of grow equipment. The Task Force worked in conjunction with the Washington State Patrol Marijuana Eradication Team in an illegal sales investigation in East Wenatchee that resulted in the removal of 620 pounds of processed marijuana waiting to be mailed out of state.

CRDTF assisted other agencies with investigations throughout the year. Department of Homeland Security, Interagency Narcotics Task Force, Seattle FBI, along with local agencies to name a few. A rash of vehicle prowls from heavy equipment in south Chelan County resulted in the theft of heavy-duty batteries. Detectives contacted the suspect on Facebook Messenger and arranged to purchase the batteries. Detectives posed as interested buyers and met with the suspect. After the purchase of the stolen batteries the suspect was arrested and booked into jail.

S.W.A.T.

The Chelan County Regional SWAT team is made up of the Chelan County Sheriff's Office, Wenatchee Police Department and the Department of Wildlife, Fish and Game.

In 2020 the CCR SWAT team was utilized on 10 different missions throughout the year. In May of 2020 the CCR SWAT team was requested to assist in a manhunt of a murder suspect and burglar on the Kittitas County side of Blewitt Pass. The manhunt lasted over 2 weeks in total and assets from all over the state of Washington were brought in. The suspect was eventually located by Kittitas County deputies in the Teanaway Valley. CCR SWAT was utilized off and on throughout the manhunt. This was the biggest coordinated Manhunt in Kittitas County history. In August of 2020 the CCR SWAT team was also utilized in a rural mission near the top of Stevens Pass where an adult male had committed a felony DV assault on his girlfriend and then fled from their campsite with their young child. The SWAT team utilized canines, night vision technology, and an Unmanned Aerial Vehicle (drone) to attempt to locate the male and the child. The male and child were located the following morning. The male suspect was booked on his felony charges and the child was taken into protective custody. The majority of the other missions CCR SWAT was involved in were barricaded subjects that refused to give up when contacted by patrol officers. CCR SWAT used crisis negotiators and best practices in SWAT tactics to ultimately have the subjects peacefully surrender and taken into custody. CCR SWAT is committed to help promote a community environment so that anyone who lives in Chelan County County feels safe. or visits Chelan



Traffic Enforcement

The Chelan County Traffic Enforcement Unit (TEU) consists of 1 Sergeant, 2 Traffic Deputies, and 1 Commercial Vehicle Deputy. They are responsible for performing traffic enforcement, drug interdiction on the highways, traffic safety education (schools and public meetings, etc), and collision investigation within the county.

The Sergeant is a Drug Recognition Expert that assists in investigations regarding drivers that are impaired by drugs other than alcohol. Two of the TEU team members are certified in Commercial Motor Vehicle Criminal Interdiction. This training allows TEU units to conduct emphasis patrols and identify illegal drug smuggling on the roadways of Washington State. The Commercial Vehicle (CV) Deputy works within the county. The CV Deputy's primary responsibility is working as the liaison between Public Works and the Chelan County Sheriff's Office. The CV Deputy's duties consist of daily contact with Chelan County Public Works Road Superintendent and Foremen, traffic enforcement, and traffic investigations in the county. One of the Traffic Deputies was promoted during 2020, leaving an open position. We are looking to fill that 4th position during the Spring /Summer of 2021.

Campus Security

There are currently two Chelan County Sheriff's Deputies assigned to Courthouse Campus Security. The Mission and Goal is to provide a safe and friendly environment for all public visitors and county employees. There are currently ten structures within the courthouse campus. Out of those ten facilities lies six courtrooms on three different levels in three different buildings. The two assigned deputies prioritize their time with courtroom and judicial security. Additional duties include physical security of the courthouse and Law & Justice Building; whereupon, each have a single point entry (security screening stations) that are staffed by a contracted private security. The private security officers are overseen by the campus deputies. The COVID-19 Pandemic resulted in many changes to better protect and safeguard all whom entered the court levels. The year of COVID-19 saw visitors' numbers far lower than in years past, the security officers screened only 62,173 in all of 2020. With a change in political climate the number of firearms safeguarded for visitors rose to twenty-two (22) as compared to zero in 2019.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

During 2020, the Chelan County Sheriff's Office Division of Emergency Management continued its ongoing mission to respond, prevent, protect, and recover from emergency situations occurring in the county. Real-world incidents requiring emergency management response during the year included, but were not limited to: a forest fire, brush fires, COVID-19 and 64 search and rescue missions. Further, several county mitigation and response plans were revised by staff.

The Chelan County Emergency Management (CCEM) team is comprised of 3 full-time Sheriff's Office personnel (a Sergeant, EM Specialist 2 and EM Specialist 1), and 2 permanent part-time EM Specialist 1 positions. One of the part-time positions focuses on responsibilities laid out within the inter-local agreement with the City of Wenatchee for EM services and is our primary "planner". The other part-time EM Specialist is assigned to "logistics" and is responsible for all interoperable communication needs for the Sheriff's Office. An inter-local agreement exists between the US Forest Service and the county to provide deputy patrol coverage and enforcement throughout the three USFS districts in Chelan County.

Chelan County Emergency Management staff are trained in the coordination of all-hazard incident response as well as search and rescue operations for the county and the contracted municipalities we serve. We work closely with fire districts, local city governments, school districts and other law enforcement agencies, as well as state and federal agencies to accomplish our mission. Hazardous material reporting - EPCRA Tier II Reports – from local companies and public agencies are funneled through CCEM and made available to local emergency response personnel should a hazmat emergency arise at a specific facility. CCEM currently chairs the Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC) which is in place to monitor, review and plan for hazmat and other all-hazard situations occurring in Chelan County.

The cities of Wenatchee, Cashmere, Leavenworth, Entiat and Chelan all contract with the Sheriff's Office via inter-local agreements for emergency management services. This involves response to incidents, event planning, public outreach, and general emergency planning for the various municipalities. The emergency management team is also responsible for the coordination of all reported search and rescue missions within the county to include federal forest lands and, upon request, North Cascades National Park. To adequately coordinate and respond on search and rescue missions, personnel must train and conduct field exercises with local volunteer search and rescue groups on a regular basis.

2020 EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT INCIDENTS

Chelan County experienced a minimal number of wildfires during the 2020 season. The largest fire of the year was the Apple Acres Fire, 5,500-acre fire 4 miles north of Chelan. There was only one other fire of significance in the county. We responded to 64 search and rescue calls this year which is an all-time high in Chelan County.

Chelan County Emergency Management staff spent most of this year dealing with the COVID-19 Pandemic. We activated the Regional Emergency Operations Center to support the Chelan-Douglas Health District and other local agencies respond to the pandemic.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

FIRES

Apple Acres Fire – September 7, 2020 Burned 5,500 acres





On September 7, 2020 at 11:33am Fire District 7 units and Chelan County Sheriff's Office deputies were dispatched to a reported fire 4 miles north of Chelan. Second and third alarms were requested as the fire spread to the north. Level 2 and Level 3 evacuation notifications were conducted with residents along Apple Acres Rd, Howard Flats, Washington Creek and Antoine Creek. This late season fire spread quickly due to strong winds and low relative humidity. This fire is believed to have been caused by an ember from the Pearl Hill fire in Douglas County.

Colockum Fire - July 24, 2020 Burned 2,967 acres





On July 24, 2020 at approximately 2:14pm Chelan County Fire District #1 and Chelan County Sheriff's Office Deputies responded to a reported brush fire 10 miles southeast of Wenatchee on Kingsbury Rd. The fire was quickly escalated to a 2-alarm brush fire. Level 3 evacuation notices were issued for Colockum, Kingsbury and Jumpoff Roads. Level 2 evacuation notices were issued for Tarpiscan and Stemilt Loop roads. The fire threatened 60 homes as well as orchards and crops in the area. The investigation determined that the fire was intentionally started and Sheriff's Office Detectives arrested a 29-year-old Wenatchee couple.

Search & Rescue

In 2020, the Chelan County Sheriff's Office responded to 64 requests to either search for missing persons or rescue injured individuals. The vast majority of the sixty-four missions involved successful rescues of injured or lost climbers, hikers, snowmobilers or rafters. The majority of Chelan County's SAR missions take place on US Forest Service land or within the North Cascades National Park.

The Sheriff's Office has deputies assigned to a high angle rope rescue team, the air support unit and a swift water rescue team which are all part of the overall SAR unit. These deputies receive specialized training throughout the year specific to their specialty team and in general SAR response.

High Profile SAR Missions

The Chelan County Sheriff's Office Search and Rescue team responded to 64 search and rescue calls, 4 of which were fatalities, in 2020. In May, search teams spent three days searching for a missing camper off of the Chiwawa Loop Road. The subject was later located deceased in the Wenatchee River by the Sheriff's Office helicopter. His body was recovered by the swift water rescue team.

In June, Chelan County Swiftwater personnel responded to a report of a paddleboarder underwater on the Wenatchee River near Blackbird Island in Leavenworth. The subject was unresponsive when she was located and brought to shore. CPR was administered by responders and the subject regained a pulse. The subject was transported to Central Washington Hospital but unfortunately passed away several days later.

In July, Chelan County Swiftwater personnel responded to a report of a missing person on the Wenatchee River near Cashmere. The subject was floating the river with friends when he went missing. The subject was eventually located by a Washington State Patrol aircraft that was working in the area. The pilot directed responders to the victim's location. The subject was located and removed from the water. CPR was administered but unfortunately the subject was later pronounced deceased by medics.

On July 11th, Chelan County Search and Rescue coordinators received a report of an injured hiker in the Crystal Creek drainage. The victim was hiking with three other people when he slipped and fell approximately 40 feet. The victim suffered a severe head and knee injury and was unable to hike out on his own. The group did not have an emergency beacon and there was no cell service in the area so the reporting party had to hike out to the trailhead and call for help. The reporting party knew the exact location of the accident so the Chelan County Sheriff's Office helicopter was deployed to attempt to locate the injured hiker. The helicopter was forced to abort the mission before locating the subject because of extremely high winds and darkness. Two Chelan County Mountain Rescue members contacted the reporting party at the trailhead and followed him to the victim's location. Once the victim's location was confirmed a hoist capable helicopter from NAS Whidbey Island was requested. The victim was later transported to Central Washington Hospital to be treated for his injuries.

In August, Chelan County Search and Rescue coordinators received a report of an emergency beacon activation in the area of Colchuck Lake. The owner of the device was reporting that a male subject in his 60's was unconscious and did not have a pulse. An Airlift Northwest helicopter was dispatched to the area. The helicopter was able to land in the area and the medic crew hiked to the patient's location. The medic confirmed that the subject was deceased. The victim was later transported out of the area by the Sheriff's Office helicopter. It was later determined that he had suffered sudden cardiac arrest.


Volunteer Organizations



The Sheriff's Office routinely relies upon the Chelan County Volunteer Search & Rescue (CCVSAR) organization and the Chelan County Mountain Rescue Association (CCMR) to assist during many of the SAR missions. Without the assistance of the dedicated and highly trained volunteers, it would be impossible to adequately respond to the number of SAR missions our agency logs each year. In 2020, the Chelan County Volunteer Search and Rescue (CCVSAR) organization logged over 1,600 hours of volunteer assistance in responding to actual search and rescue missions. Chelan County Mountain Rescue (CCMR) assisted the Sheriff's Office with 14 mountain rescue missions in the county.

Air Support Unit

The Chelan County Air Support Unit provides assistance for several functions within the Sheriff's Office, although the primary function is search and rescue activity. The unit conducted 23 SAR missions in Chelan County, as well as several missions in other neighboring counties in 2020. ASU also supported aerial filming in Chelan County of a Korean war film. The air support unit's goal is to continue to strive to meet the continuing demands of increased usage of persons recreating in Chelan County.



MARINE PATROL

The Chelan County Sheriff's Office Marine Patrol Unit is responsible for patrolling the waters of Chelan County for the purpose of preventing crime, enforcing federal, state, and county laws. In addition, the Marine Patrol Unit is responsible for performing rescue operations for persons and vessels in distress, assisting other divisions and agencies as needed, maintaining buoys and navigational markers, and investigating marine accidents and incidents.

The major waterways the Chelan County Sheriff's Office Marine Unit is responsible for, include; Lake Chelan (52 miles long), 70 miles of the Columbia River, Lake Wenatchee, Wapato Lake, and the Wenatchee River. There are many other additional lakes and rivers that the marine unit patrols and performs Search and Rescues.

The Marine Patrol Unit consists of:

- 1 part time Deputy that administers the Marine Patrol Unit
- 1 part time Deputy (Summer Time)
- 1 Sergeant that oversees the Unit
- 3 boats
- 2 Sea Doo PWCs
- 20 Marine Certified Deputies

In 2020, despite the limitations due to Covid 19, the Chelan County Marine Patrol vessels spent 244 hours on the waters of Chelan County. Deputies conducted 87 written vessel inspections along with 159 contacts. They also assisted 14 people on the water that were in need of immediate assistance, in addition to 48 non-emergent vessel assists.

The Marine Patrol Unit provides presentations to the public to promote boating safety. They also provide a Boating Education class for citizens to obtain their required Boaters Safety Card. Due to Covid 19 restrictions, no classes were able to given in 2020.

In 2020 Chelan County Marine Patrol continued its partnership with Lake Chelan School District by talking to students about water safety and taking students on the waters of Lake Chelan as part of a Lifetime Activities Class. Marine Patrol also partnered with Manson School District to provide high school students with the Washington State Boaters Safety Class. This class provided the participating students with a Washington State Boaters Education Card. These interactions give deputies the ability to build positive relationships with students, as well as promote boating safety. The Sheriff's Office looks forward to continuing these annual programs.

The overall mission of the Chelan County Marine Patrol is to continue to promote safe boating, through education, enforcement, and community interaction. With the ultimate goal of making the waters of Chelan County a safe place for people to recreate.

K-9





CCSO K9 Year in Review 2020

Deputy Lamon gained a new K9 partner in 2020. Kane, a Belgian Malinois, was certified in March of 2020 and joined a nightshift patrol squad. Since then the team logged 32 deployments and was involved in 9 arrests for the year. Deputy Lamon has a passion for K9 and is cognizant of regional opportunities to utilize his partner and offer their services. K9 Kane is an enthusiastic and high energy police dog with a bright future.

Deputy Norton and his K9 partner Asa recorded 28 deployments resulting in 9 arrests for the year of 2020. Asa is also a part of the regional SWAT team and recorded 10 tactical deployments. Deputy Norton and Asa worked together on dayshift patrol for 2020, and responded to calls throughout the greater Chelan/Douglas area. K9 Asa will continue to be an asset for patrol and on tactical deployments for years to come.


Deputy Hegberg completed a busy and productive year with his K9 partner Ruben. Together the team was responsible for the location and/or seizure of approximately 4,000 grams of Methamphetamines, 770 grams of Heroin, 400 Fentanyl pills, 50 Xanax, 75 Suboxone, 32 pounds of marijuana, 7 handguns, 1 AK-47, and approximately \$12,300 in cash. K9 Ruben has become a regional K9 asset in assisting WPD, EWPD, DCSO, WSP, USPS, and the CRDTF.

Civil / Records

There were monumental interruptions to normal business in 2020 for our Civil and Records Divisions due to COVID. The divisions were faced with a short-term closures to the public due to COVID that required the divisions to rethink how they could still serve the public while not doing face-to-face business. Also, with the courts significantly cutting back on their normal daily activity and proceedings and the moratorium on evictions, all together caused a trickle down effect for our warrant, protection orders, and process service duties by significantly decreasing their issuance.




