- 1. Welcome and Introductions
  - Vice Chair Ed Martinez called the meeting to order.
- 2. Public Comment
  - There were no members of the public present.
- 3. Review Meeting Summary from April 18, 2024
  - Ed Martinez noted that the meeting summary contained broken links. The meeting summary was approved with corrections to the links.
- 4. Plan Review (see following pages)
  - Revisit critical facilities definition
    - After conducting research, Christina recommended modifications to critical facility definition approved during the last meeting, to correctly categorize the additional facilities that were added into the definitions.
    - A member suggested adding in irrigation systems to the critical facilities definition because it may crucial to firefighting efforts. The committee members agreed with the proposed revisions and addition of irrigation. The updated definition reads as follows:

A critical facility is any structure, facility, or other improvement that, because of its function, service area, or uniqueness, provides service that enables the continuous operation of critical business and government functions, and is critical to human health and safety or economic security. For the purposes of this hazard mitigation plan, all FEMA Community Lifelines are defined as critical facilities:

- Safety and Security—Law Enforcement/Security, Fire Service, Search and Rescue, Government Service, Community Facilities, Schools, Community Safety
- Food, Hydration, Shelter—Food, Hydration, Shelter, Agriculture, Irrigation Systems
- Health and Medical—Medical Care, Public Health, Patient Movement, Medical Supply Chain, Fatality Management
- **Energy**—Power Grid, Generation Systems, Dams, Fuel, Pipelines
- **Communications**—Infrastructure, Responder Communications, Alerts Warnings and Messages, Finance, 911 and Dispatch
- Transportation—Highway/Roadway/Motor Vehicle, Mass Transit, Railway, Aviation, Maritime
- Hazardous Materials—Facilities, HAZMAT, Pollutants and Contaminants
- Water Systems Potable Water Infrastructure, Wastewater Management Infrastructure
- Revisit social vulnerability
  - Christina updated the committee on the planning team's recommends for incorporating vulnerable populations into the Plan. The planning team recommend the planning process use the Social Vulnerability Index (SVI) map to identify vulnerable populations and be utilized as a component in the overall risk assessment. This decision was approved by consensus.
- Review objectives
  - Christina explained the difference between objectives and actions and reviewed answers from the survey taken by Steering Committee members prior to the meeting. Steering committee members discussed each objective, reviewed the survey responses, and any wordsmithing, left

- as-is, combined, or deleted objectives. After the meeting, the consultant team updated the list of which goals each objective can be applied.
- The following objectives were approved, by consensus (shown with changes from previous plan objectives):
